## LA Chargers Training Facility Runs on Recycled Water

### **Conservation Tip**

Brown grass...don't worry!



Summer is here and the grass may be looking less green than you're used to. This might surprise you, but you don't need to water your grass much at all. Despite the lawn turning brown, that doesn't mean your grass is dead. Grass goes dormant in extreme heat and drought and can adapt to using less water to survive. Your lawn's vibrancy will return when the temps and rainfall come back around during the wetter seasons. It's ok to turn off those sprinklers and irrigation systems to conserve water and save money on your bill!

Or, better yet, try replacing your lawn with a California native drought-tolerant garden instead. Summer is the perfect time to start allowing your grass to die off for removal and the fall planting

season. Just make sure to sign up in advance to be eligible for a money-back rebate.
